


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sporting report



ORAN PARK SUPERSPRINT - 18.5.86


Only two entries from our club, probably due to doubtful weather conditions. Since I'd loaded my machine the day before we decided to give it a chance.




Sydney.


This proved a magic weekend and I know I will not be alone in making this a must next year. Thanks to Bruce and Karin for organising such a good one.














MONTE CARLO NIGHT

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THOSE WERE THE DAYS ..

It is gay Paris on the night of June 25th, 1902. Special trains, hackney carriages, bicycles, cars and everything that Paris could muster in the way of transport carries the fanatics and the curious to Champigny - to the start of the Paris - Vienna Race.

The Race of Races.

This was what the newspapers had christened the contest through areas as yet untouched by the motor car.

117 competitors had entered a duel, not only between man

and machine, but also between theories and potential designs.

It was at Innsbruck that Louis Renault's troubles started. His car collided with that of Baron de Custers. Louis and Szisz (mechanic), in grease up to their necks, lost several hours in repairing the damaged differential. By one trick after another, with string, wire, insulating tape, cotton waste to plug the cracks in the rear axle housing and sawdust to thicken the oil, they managed to repair the car and continue the race. Near Salzburg they saw a closed level crossing too late, hit the first gate taking it with them into the second one.

The bonnet of the car was dented, the radiator leaked, one wheel was broken and the front axle twisted. They removed the damaged parts and carried them to the nearest village. While Szisz, who had got the blacksmith out of bed, straightened the axle, Louis repaired the wheel, replacing the broken spokes with three cross bars from a chair. As for the cracked radiator, they decided not to stop for a detail like this. With Louis Renault at the wheel and Szisz lying along the bonnet continually pouring water in the boiling radiator, they drove on.

At Wills, Farman in a Hanhard was leading but Marcel Renault (Louis' brother) was catching rapidly. Marcel caught up to Edmont's Durracq, but Edmond refused to let him overtake and

remained in the centre of the road. Marcel did not hesitate. He plunged into the blinding cloud of dust, pulled right over onto the left hand verge and roared past shouting insults and taking off the left hand wing of the Durracq in the process.

Finally, Marcel caught up with Farman. For several miles, the race between Marcel and Farman was a ferocious wheel to wheel affair with Farman gaining a little on the straights only to be caught up again by the Renault at the next corner. Finally, 33 miles from Vienna, Marcel passed Farman on a corner and moved into the lead. At Vienna the news had moved slower than the cars. A colourful crowd, all dressed in their Sunday best mingling with hawkers selling souvenirs and pictures of competitors, had invaded the Prater (sports ground) where the race was to finish. The first arrivals were expected towards two in the afternoon. Marcel was there by noon, before the officials.

He could not get into the Prater, his German was rudimentary and everybody took him for a gate crasher. Laboriously he said, "I am Marcel Renault. I have come from Paris." The crowd went wild. The feeling was indescribable. The Loudspeakers announced Marcel Renault's time of 26 hours, 10 minutes, 47 seconds, achieved with a frightening average of 39 mph overall. He had covered the distance in seven hours less than the Arlberg Express train. A quarter of an hour later, Farman driving the French Durracq passed the finishing line, followed by the first of the German competitors, Count Zborowski in a Mercedes.

So ended the Paris - Vienna Race.
