We had no doubt that the day and the weather would be perfect as we drove passed the Pope's Kenthurst retreat. One can't help but think Paul and Jan had a little divine intervention on the day. Thanks Paul and Jan (and Pope Ben) for a well organized drive and lunch.

SPORTING RTEPORT

Lindsay Day has competed in a further two rounds of the CSCA supersprint series and here is his report.

"28 June 08 was the fourth round of the CSCA hosted by Austin Healey at Wakefield Park. Out of bed at 0430 and left at 0500 for the run to Goulburn. Car went well on the way down and I did not find any fog till about 10 km before Goulburn. Proceeded at a more moderate pace down to Wakefield Park where the main gate could not be seen from the 150m warning sign. Minimal use of the scrutineering rag was required and the car was passed to run. But the fog had not lifted... Drivers briefing was held in the fog... As were the familiarity laps for those new to the circuit... a local trick to stir the fog up and get it to lift... which worked. Then a very pleasant day with little breeze and warm sunshine. My best lap was the last lap of my second set with a 1:24.7 being recorded which is within half a second of my PB and earned me a class win. During my third set of laps I came around turn 2 to find myself face to face with a very nice shiny red E type convertible which was also very stationary, the car in front of me went one side of him and I went the other. There was also an incident earlier in the day where a Triumph Stag rolled at the fish hook and was looking definitely the worse for wear. The driver had some sore ribs but may have been in much worse condition when his wife got hold of him.

The fifth round of the CSCA was held at Oran Park GP circuit on 3 August 08. I was looking forward to a good round but the early portents were not good. Firstly the car was running rough on the expressway on the run out to Oran Park, then there was no electricity, timing or phones working at the control tower end of the circuit so the start was to be delayed. The strong winds overnight had caused a power line failure outside the circuit. The circuit was also strewn with large pads that are usually applied to the walls at certain points. Eventually the power returned so the running got underway with only a short delay but the car pig rooted and coughed its way around the circuit running on 5, 5 and a half and sometimes on six cylinders. Investigation in the pits revealed number 2 injector nozzle partially blocked with gum and providing a very poor spray pattern but even after an injector change it would still pop and misfire when revved. Then I remembered that I had recently changed fuel brand to get my 4c per litre that I was paying on groceries but not collecting. So I had a tankful of Vortex 98 for the first time.... in a car tuned to BP Ultimate 98 which also runs well on V Power. So an early shower with a second in class. Following day I took out about 15 litres from the one

third of a tank still in the car, cleaned the #2 injector nozzle and went down the road and filled up with Ultimate 98 including a dose of injector cleaner, and within 5 km of driving it was back to its usual happy self.

Next round for me will be the sixth round of the CSCA hosted by Morgan at Eastern Creek the day before Shannon's Day. I will be making sure I have the right fuel on board!"

Good luck at Eastern Creek Lindsay. Malcolm.



DID YOU KNOW.....

The next time you are washing your hands and complain about the water temperature isn't just how you like it, think about how things used to be. Here are some startling facts that date back to the 1500s:

Most people got married in June because they took their yearly bath in May and still smelled pretty good by June. But they were starting to turn so brides carried a bouquet of flowers to hide the body ordour. Hence, the custom today of carrying a bouquet when getting married.

Baths consisted of a big tub filled with hot water. The man of the house had the privilege of the nice clean water, then all the sons and men, then the women and finally the children. Last of all the babies. By then the water was so dirty you could actually lose someone in it. Hence the saying "don't throw the baby out with the bath water".

Houses had thatched roofs, thick straw piled high with no wood underneath. It was the only place for animals to stay warm, so all the cats and other animals (mice and bugs) lived in the roof. When it rained the roof became slippery and sometimes the animals would slip and fall off the roof. Hence the saying "it's raining cats and dogs".

There was nothing to stop things from falling into the house. This posed a real problem in the bedroom where bugs and other droppings would mess up the nice clean bed. Hence, a bed with four big posts and a sheet hung over the top afforded some protection. That's how the canopy beds came into existence. The floor was dirt. Only the wealthy had something else other than dirt. Hence the saying "dirt poor" The wealthy had slate floors that would get slippery in the winter when wet, so they spread thresh (straw) on the floor to help keep their feet. As the winter wore on they added more thresh until when the door was opened it would all start slipping outside. So a piece of wood was placed in the entranceway to stop this from happening. Hence we have the "threshold".

In those old days they cooked in the kitchen with a big kettle that always hung over the fire. Every day they lit the fire and added things to the pot. Mostly they ate vegetables and did not get much meat. They would eat the stew for dinner leaving leftovers in the pot to get cold and would then start over the next day. Sometimes the stew had food in it that had been there for quite a while. Hence the rhyme, "peas porridge hot, peas porridge cold, peas porridge in the pot nine days old".

Sometimes they could obtain pork which made them feel quite special and when visitors called they would hang their bacon to show off. It was a sign of wealth that a man could "bring home the bacon". They would cut off a small piece to share with their guests and would all sit around and "chew the fat".

Those with money had plates made of pewter. Some food with high acid content caused the lead from the pewter to leach onto the food causing lead poisoning and death. This happened most often with tomatoes, so for the next 400 years tomatoes were considered poisonous.

Bread was divided according to status; workers got the burnt bottom of the loaf, the family got the middle and guests got the top, or "the upper crust".

Lead cups were used to drink ale or whiskey. The combination would knock the imbibers out for a couple of days. So inebriated, some were taken for dead and were prepared for burial. They were laid on the kitchen table for a couple of days and the family would gather to eat and drink and wait to see if they would wake up. Hence the custom of holding a wake.

England is old and small and the local folks were running out of places to bury people. So they would dig up the old coffins and take the bones to the bone house, and re-use the graves. When opening these coffins they found 1 in 25 had scratch marks on the inside and it was realized that they were burying people alive. So they would tie a string of the wrist of the corpse, lead it through the coffin up to the ground and tie the end to a bell. Someone would sit out in the grave yard all night ("the graveyard shift") and listen for the bell. Thus someone could be "saved by the bell" or was considered a "dead ringer".

And that's the truth.
